Common Name: Ring-tailed lemur
Scientific Name: *Lemur catta*
Distinguishing Characteristics: The ring-tailed lemurs have gray or rosy brown backs and white stomachs. Their faces are also white with triangular black markings around their eyes and black noses. They have very long, black and white tails. The tail is longer than the body, measuring up to 2 ft. They can each weigh between 5 to 7 lbs. Their hind legs are longer than their forelegs.

Habitat: These lemurs are found in southern Madagascar. They live in arid, open areas and forests. They like to spend most of their time on the ground (and less time in the trees) than any other species of lemur.

Wild Diet: They eat leaves, flowers, fruit, and even sap and bark. They feed from many different species of plants and trees, but they prefer Kily trees. Occasionally they will eat insects.

Facts: Ring-tailed lemurs are social animals, living in groups of 12 to 24 individuals. They often interact socially while feeding and sunbathing. They love to lie around in the sun with their legs extended, especially in the morning soaking up the warmth of the sun. Females are the dominate ones in the group. Ring-tailed lemurs are endangered, mainly due to habitat destruction caused by people who clear land for farming and logging.

Here is a wonderful story of a white-handed gibbon and his adopted parents who came to the Santa Ana Zoo this past summer.

Southern California residents Mr. and Mrs. Chuck Kalberg enjoy trips to Hawaii, and they always visit the Honolulu Zoo on their vacations. One year they started a tradition of adopting an animal at the Honolulu Zoo each time a grandchild was born. The first adopted animal was a stork in honor of the first grandchild. When their second and third grandchildren were born, they adopted Mycah and Emma, baby white-handed gibbons.

The Kalbergs visited their adopted friends at the Honolulu Zoo with every trip to Hawaii. In 2005, they found that Mycah had been moved to the mainland, possibly to the San Diego Zoo. Unfortunately, after a trip to the San Diego Zoo, they discovered that Mycah was not there either, and they thought they would probably never see him again.

Then, this past summer, their granddaughter participated in a field trip to the Santa Ana Zoo, taking her mom along as a chaperone. When the class reached Monkey Row, Nancy, the Kalberg's daughter noticed a male gibbon and heard him called Mycah!

She quickly asked a keeper if Mycah was really his name, and also wanted to make sure that this was not a common name given to the species. The keeper said yes, this was indeed Mycah, and that it is not a common name given to them.

Excited to hear that Mycah, the gibbon they adopted as a baby was right here at the Santa Ana Zoo, the Kalberg's happily came to visit him, and then reported back to the Honolulu Zoological Society how big and beautiful he has become!

Mycah currently resides with Princess, our female white-handed gibbon on Monkey Row.

Choo Choo Chatter

What makes them go? Looking back through the pages of history, we learn that the first trains really became popular back in the 1850's, and the engines in those days were powered by steam. Think of the engine like having a wood fire in your fireplace at home. Your mother wants some hot tea, so she hangs a pot of water over the fire, and slowly the water starts to get hotter and then it boils. The same thing would happen with an old steam engine—it needed fire and water to make it go!

The first locomotives used wood as fuel—wood and water were stored in the "tender" behind the engine, and the fireman would pump water into the long round tank on the front of the steam engine known as a boiler. After filling the firebox with wood, he would light the wood which heated the water, and that made steam—just like the pot in your fireplace. In this case, the steam pressure would push against some rods and pistons that made the driving wheels turn. No matter how small or large the steam locomotive was, the basic principal of fire and water drove these engines for over 100 years.

Once railroads started to cross the United States, finding the fuel to burn and the water to heat up became difficult. There weren't a lot of trees to cut for wood in the open plains of the Midwest, and looking for water was even more difficult unless there was a lake or river close by.
